1. Introduction

The National Institute of Traditional Medicine (NITM) was established in 1971 at Dechencholing as per the National Assembly Resolution No. 32, Article 11 to develop human resources for the traditional medical service with the recruitment of 8 students for Menpa training. On the Royal Command of His Majesty JigmeSingyeWangchuck, the fourth King of Bhutan, the DrungtshoCourse (B.Sc. TM) was started in 1978. The training center was shifted to the present site in 1992 and the training programmes were conducted under the Ministry of Health (MoH). In 2003, NITM became one of the founding members of the Royal University of Bhutan (RUB) and in 2007 it was officially transferred to RUB from the MoH. The Royal University of Bhutan was delinked from the Royal Civil Service Commission and functioned as an Autonomous and independent organization from July 2011. On 29th November 2013, the National Institute of Traditional Medicine was delinked from the Royal University of Bhutan and transferred to the Khesar Gyalpo University of Medical Sciences of Bhutan as per the Government directives and renamed as the Faculty of Traditional Medicine (FoTM).

1.1. Vision

The Faculty aspires to become a center of excellence in traditional medicine education and research that produces GNH inspired graduates with appropriate knowledge and skills to meet the international standards.

1.2. Mission

The Faculty will strive to achieve excellence in the design, development and delivery of Sowa Rigpa education programmes through research and innovation, blending the rich ancient wisdom and modern science to make the programmes relevant for the current health needs of the people.

1.3. Objectives:

- 1.3.1. To develop human resource for traditional medical services in the country.
- 1.3.2. To strengthen and develop Sowa Rigpa system of medicines through research and development.
- 1.3.3. To develop into a premier institute of learning in Sowa Rigpa and practices with the state of art infrastructure, management and teaching and learning facilities.

1.4. Mandates, Functions, Roles and Responsibilities

1.4.1. Incorporate the values and principles of Gross National Happiness (GNH) as educational foundations for all programmes.

- 1.4.2. Provide quality education and training in Sowa Rigpa to both national and international students.
- 1.4.3. Enhance the quality of educational programmes through increasing international partnerships and collaborations.
- 1.4.4. Serve as the Knowledge hub in traditional medicine by working closely with community and industry.
- 1.4.5. Contribute to opening up new paths to better future through research and inquiry.
- 1.4.6. Provide continuing medical education for enhancing knowledge and skills of the practitioners.
- 1.4.7. Diversify Sowa Rigpa education programmes based on the current health needs of the country.
- 1.4.8. Preserve and promote the rich cultural heritage of the country.

2. Major Activities for 2015-16

2.1. Programme Development:

- 2.1.1. As per the recommendation of validation team for Drungtsho and sMenpa curriculums, practical guidelines and logbook for thestudents was developed and finalized during the consultation and coordination workshop held in January and May 2016.
- 2.1.2. The curriculum for Sorig Pharmacy was developed and submitted to the KhesarGyalpoUniversity of Medical Sciences of Bhutan for the validation. Accordingly, the curriculum was validated and the course is ready to be offered from July 2016 onwards.
- 2.1.3. The Curriculum for short term training on Sowa Rigpawas developed and submitted to the KGUMSB.
- 2.1.4. The curriculum for the Certificate course in Sorig Massage was also developed and submitted to KGUMSB for endorsement.

2.2. Field Training Programmes

- 2.2.1. As per the curriculum, 3rd and 7th semester Drungtsho and 3rd semester sMenpa trainees along with a lecturer went to Lingzhifor the identification and harvesting method of high altitude medicinalplants/herbs in August 2015.
- 2.2.2. The 5th semester sMenpa and 7th semester Drungtsho trainees were taken for the low altitude medicinal plants identification as practical field training in Trongsa and Gelephuin line with the module in the month of October 2015.
- 2.2.3. To understand bothmodern health care delivery system and traditional medicinal services, as well as motivation for Sowa Rigpa, the 1st year students were taken for orientation tour to three units of traditional medicine and faculty of nursing and public health and different hospitals and Basic Health Unitsunder Paro and PunakhaDzongkhags in August 2015.
- 2.2.4. To impart training based on actual service needs of the public and to achieve the objectives of the institute, the 1st year Drungtsho and Menpa students were taken for the identification of Tshachus(hot medicated spring) and Menchus(medicated spring) in Gasa and PunakhaDzongkhags in November 2015.

2.3. Staff Development

- 2.3.1. The Dy. Dean of student and Provost attended the Certificate Course in Counseling Psychology at the Sampurna Montfort College, Old Madras Road, Bangalore-India with the funding support from the University in May 2016.
- 2.3.2. Assistant Administrative Officer and Administrative assistant attended the Result Based management (RBM) at Paro December 2015.
- 2.3.3. Four support staffs are undergoing continuing education programme (degree) at the Royal Thimphu College.
- 2.3.4. Two lecturers attended the 1st level Human workshop and another two lecturers attended the 2nd level Human value workshop at Gedu college of Business Studies in April 2016.
- 2.3.5. One lecturer attended the reviewer training and two lecturers attended the author training conducted by Bhutan Health Journal (BHJ), KhesarGyalpo University of Medical sciences of Bhutan in July 2015.
